A NEW YEAR'S MEDITATION: OUR TIMES ARE IN HIS HANDS!

I spent some time on the day after Christmas reviewing those scripture passages assigned for reading on New Year's Day. The Old Testament reading for the first day of January is Ecclesiastes 3:1-13. That passage begins with those immortal words: "For everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die..." Later in the day, with those words still haunting my memory, I learned that one of our congregants had passed away.

A few days later, when I gathered with the family for the funeral, I reminded them of those words from Ecclesiastes, and also the words of Psalm 31:14-16 where the Psalmist says: "I trust in you O Lord; I say, "You are my God,' My times are in your hand...Let your face shine upon your servant; save me in your steadfast love." I reminded them that their loved one was always in the hand of God. All of his times, all of his season, all of his purposes were in God's loving hand. He was in God's hand while he lived. He was in God's hand when he died. He is in God's hand even now. And, as the Psalmist suggests, God's hands are full of steadfast love — always loving, wise, kind, and good for those who trust in him! As we begin a New Year, we currently have no way of knowing precisely what this year will hold. Will it be a year of planting or plucking, killing or healing, breaking or building, weeping or laughing, mourning or dancing, throwing out or gathering in, embracing or refraining, seeking or loosing, keeping or casting out, tearing or mending, silence or speech, loving or hating, fighting or finding peace? (Eccl. 3:2-18) Truth be told, we'll probably experience some or all of these seasons during the coming year; though which of them and to what degree we'll face them will likely remain a mystery until they finally come.

No, we currently have no way of knowing precisely what this year will hold. But we know who will hold us in the coming year. "I trust in you O Lord; I say, "You are my God," My times are in your hand...Let your face shine upon your servant; save me in your steadfast love." Yes, our times are in the hands of God. And because we are in God's hands, we can face the coming year with confidence and hope! So, I wish you a Happy New Year, one and all! Amen!

ROUNDTABLE current study is Diana Butler Bass' latest book entitled Grounded: Finding God in the World, A Spiritual Revolution, (New York, Harper Collins, 2017). Diana Butler Bass, leading commentator on religion, politics, and culture, follows up her acclaimed book *Christianity After Religion* by arguing that what appears to be a decline actually signals a major transformation in how people understand and experience God. The distant God of conventional religion has given way to a more intimate sense of the sacred that is with us in the world. This shift, from a vertical understanding of God to a God found on the horizons of nature and human community, is at the heart of a spiritual revolution that surrounds us — and that is challenging not only religious institutions but political and social ones as well. The study begins December 10. All are invited to join the class in the Multipurpose Room, located directly behind the Fellowship Hall. Class begins at 8:30 am each Sunday.

Christmas reminds us that God is indeed with us – all of us – and wants all of us to live together in peace as we live together with Him! Although the Commission was on break for the holiday, the Council of Bishops did publish a booklet containing many of the foundational documents supporting the Commission in its work. In the coming months, our church will prepare, through study, discussion, and discernment, to receive the Commission's report to the denomination, which should be published in June or July of this year. Please pray that we may prepare our hearts to receive this report by using the same principles that have governed the members of the Way Forward Commission in their work together. Specifically, may we covenant to treat one another with respect, to assume the best in others, to represent one another in the best possible light, to speak the truth with love, and to practice and expect trustworthiness. May we also do our part to offer grace, to create an atmosphere of hospitality, and to moderate our anxiety through mutual encouragement, good humor, and genuine love for one another. Finally, may we covenant to listen actively to others, to seek first to understand rather than to be understood, to ask for clarity or help from others, and to be patient with one another as we study this matter. By doing these things, I believe we can grow together and not apart as we study this important issue.

Punch Slush

Step 1: Bring to boil 4 cups water and 6 cups sugar. Set aside to cool.

Step 2: Combine:

1-46 oz can pineapple juice

1-46 oz can of orange juice

1-large can of frozen orange juice plus one can of water

1-large can or frozen lemonade plus one can of water

Step 3: Combine above juice mixture and cooled sugar mixture. I put it in small plastic bowls for easier serving. Freeze

Step 4: An hour or so before serving remove frozen punch from the freezer.

Step 5: Combine equal amounts of frozen slush with sprite, 7-up or ginger ale.
