THE BRIDGE BUILDER

I recently read the story of two brothers who lived on adjoining farms. These brothers had quarreled over some matter and a great bitterness stood between them. One of the brothers even went so far as to have a creek built on the property line to separate their two properties. Then one day a carpenter appeared at the other brother's house asking for work. The brother showed the carpenter the creek and said, "Look what my brother did. He built this creek to keep us apart. I want you to build a fence so high that I won't ever have to look at my brother again." The carpenter immediately went to work; surprisingly, he knocked on the man's door at the end of the day claiming to have finished the project he had been assigned. When the man went to see the fence, he found a bridge instead. The carpenter had bridged the creek and the other brother, seeing the bridge, was so moved by the mistaken notion that his brother had built a bridge to reconnect them that he came down to meet his brother on the bridge where the two of them embraced and were reconciled.

As you know, Jesus was a carpenter. In the Latin translation of the New Testament, he is often called the *pontifex*. A *pontifex* is a bridge builder. So you see, Jesus the carpenter came to build bridges. He came to build bridges of reconciliation between us and God, between us and our enemies, between us and our neighbors, between us and our fellow Christians, and between us and all of creation. As I look out on the world, I see many bridges that need to be built. The question is this: Will we join Jesus in building bridges or will we build fences? Second Corinthians 5:18 says, "God...reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation." We are called to be bridge builders!

Mountain View UMC exists to make disciples who love like Jesus, creating a world where God's love reigns! If we want to be faithful to our purpose, then we must be about the ministry of reconciliation and the business of building bridges. Over the next several weeks of worship, we'll explore what this means from a variety of angles. Come to worship where you'll be reconciled to God and better equipped to be a reconciling influence in our world!

On May 6, 2018 the Contemporary Christian Roundtable (CCR) will begin a study of the book *If the Church Were Christian: Rediscovering the Values of Jesus* by Philip Gulley. The study will commence for ten weeks, ending on July 8, 2018. Philip Gulley is a Quaker minister, writer, husband and father. He is the best-selling author of *Front Porch Tales* and coauthor of *If Grace Is True* and *If God Is Love*. He hosts Porch Talk on the Emmy Award-winning Indiana PBS affiliate WFYI show "Across Indiana." Gulley lives with his wife and two sons in Indiana and is a frequent speaker at churches, colleges and retreat centers across the country.

The Contemporary Christian Roundtable is an adult Sunday school class within Mountain View United Methodist Church. The group has three objectives. They are to (1) study topics which will empower and inform our faith, (2) enhance our ability to articulate and express our faith and (3) be a supportive and reconciling faith community within the larger Mountain View community. We

honor and celebrate the diversity of all God's creation and welcome ALL people (including all sexual orientations and gender identities), regardless of who they are, where they have been, or what they believe. All are invited to join us in study, service, prayer, and the thoughtful, honest sharing of our faith journey.

VOICES IN PRAYER: Meets Sunday morning immediately following worship at the front of the sanctuary to pray for concerns that have been shared during worship.

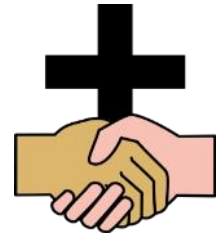

HAPPY BIRTHDAY UMC!

April 23, 1968... Dallas, Texas. That was the day the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church came together to become the United Methodist Church. The day was marked with high hopes and bold dreams about how these two denominations which had been so close in so many ways could now move forward as one. The great Albert Outler was asked to preach the sermon for the uniting ceremony. The title of the sermon was "The Unfinished Business of an Unfinished Church." Reading it 50 years later, it is still a powerful statement of who we wanted to be and what we wanted this church to become. Outler looked back to the days when there were actually five branches – the Methodist Episcopal Church in the north, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, the United Brethren Church, the Evangelical Association and the Methodist Protestant Church. He said, "Where once, scarcely a generation ago, there were five churches, now there is one. The United Methodist Council of Bishops is expected to publish a report on human sexuality and homosexuality no later than early July. A special General Conference of our denomination will meet in February of 2019 to act on the recommendations in that report. Our Church Council has authorized a survey of the congregation to determine what you most value about the ministry at Mountain View, what you most value about the ministry of our denomination, and what your views are regarding issues surrounding homosexuality. Members and active constituents will receive a letter by mail explaining this survey. The survey will be administered during existing small group meetings and following worship during the month of May. Please participate in this very important survey to assist our church in planning how to strengthen our existing ministries and how best to respond to the denominational report and subsequent denominational actions. And please keep in mind that our goals are to foster mutual understanding among church members of divergent views, to maximize unity within our congregation, and to bring all of us together around our stated purpose of making disciples who love like Jesus in order to create a world where God's love reigns!

UPDATE ON OUR STRATEGIC PLAN GOD IS WORKING AT MOUNTAIN VIEW

As you know, *Mountain View UMC exists to make disciples who love like Jesus, creating a world where God's love reigns.* We accomplish our purpose as we **Invite** people to follow Jesus, **Integrate** them into the life of the congregation, **Educate** them in the meaning of discipleship, and **Employ** them in missional ministry in Jesus name. Earlier this year, we reorganized our program committees around these four ministry tasks to form four Ministry Teams: 1) an Invitational Ministry Team, 2) an Integrational Ministry Team, 3) an Educational Ministry Team, and 4) a Missional Ministry Team. Two other ministry teams support these four teams in their work – The Worship Team and the Stewardship Team. These teams met recently in a Council on Ministry to celebrate what they have accomplished this year and to lay out their plans for the future. Each team is doing great work and all are helping us move forward in meeting our purpose. For example:

The Invitational Ministry Team: Designed Mountain View tote bags to be sold at cost to the congregation in order to heighten our church's visibility in the community. These tote bags will also be given free of charge at the Mountain View booth planned for the Farmer's Market and the 4th of July celebration at Memorial Park. Increased our level of advertisement in a variety of local media. Planning a block party for the community and a banquet to honor leaders of those outside organizations that meet in our church.

The Integrational Ministry Team: Established a team to follow-up on guests, visitors, seasonal attendees, and absentees. Established a mentorship program to follow-up with new members to ensure they integrate into the life of the congregation. Oversaw food ministry in support of families needing meals during times of sickness/crisis. Gave MVUMC mugs to all of the new residents in the Clock Tower apartment complex. Provided transportation for those needing transport to doctor's appointments, etc.

The Educational Ministry Team: Hired a new Director of Children and Youth Ministry. Started a puppet ministry during Sunday school. Shifted to a rotational curriculum with children designed to facilitate learning through art, music, science, and cooking projects. Partnered with Missional Ministry Team to execute a mission trip to Belize. Exploring ways to better reach our younger members. Planning Vacation Bible School and supporting a community-wide Day Camp for children ages 7-12 scheduled for June.

The Missional Ministry Team: Executed five local mission projects (One Nation Walking, Marion House, Lion's Camp, Food Pantry) and one international trip (Belize). Raised nearly \$4,000 through communion offerings since the beginning of the year. Planning multiple mission projects for the next quarter.

The Worship Ministry Team: Oversaw special seasonal services for Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter. Raised \$565 dollars through the annual Easter offering to support the ministry of Day-break Adult Day Program.

The Stewardship Team: Began developing a 12-month stewardship calendar. Instituted monthly stewardship moments to celebrate what God is doing through Mountain View as we use our time, talent, and treasure for his glory. Working to develop annual stewardship emphasis and a program for planned and legacy giving.

As you can see, all of our program teams, supported by our finance, trustee, staff parish, and nomination committees, are doing great work! Please pray for them as they lead us forward in making disciples who love like Jesus, creating a world where God's love reigns!

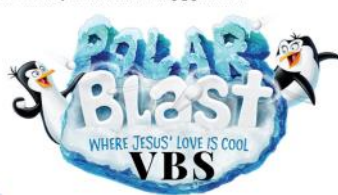

FOOD MINISTRY

There are many folks in our congregation who are experiencing difficult times with health issues.

Questions have been asked, "How can I help?, Is there anything you need?"

This question has spurred the idea of creating a supply of meals that will be kept in our church freezer. When a need arises, we'll be prepared to help.

As we create meals at home, let us keep this ministry in mind by adding a few extra ingredients to be packaged. Let's have fresh meals stored in the freezer; not haphazard left-overs. Aluminum containers tightly sealed should be clearly marked with contents, reheating directions and the date prepared. The meals will be delivered as needed.
