Sixth, I want to thank all of you who come to church every Sunday morning and special activities to listen to me go on about the faith. It would take another newsletter and a lot of hard work by Sandy to name you all. Sandy works hard enough as it is! But know that you are all special to me and I thank you for your trust and especially your understanding and grace for those times when I may have made you uncomfortable by what I preached. My hope was that when you left church that you knew that God loved you for who you are and that you were better prepared for what the world would throw at you that week.

As you can see, I have a lot to be grateful for being your Pastor. When I un-retired myself in 2020 and went back to the pulpit, I knew that circumstances changed for pastors and churches. My hope in returning to the pulpit after being out in the world was that I could help churches find their unique calling from God. The Church in Great Falls, MT discovered their calling was helping the poor and homeless. I hope that I have helped you discover your unique calling among all the independent and non-denominational churches in Woodland Park. I believe that your calling is to be the church of grace and acceptance and belonging for

those in Woodland Park who don't have a church home or are looking for a place to call home (the nones and dones).

When I first came to you, I asked many of you to do a Spiritual gifts inventory to give me a better idea of how God can use you. I discovered that your three main gifts are encouragement, faith, and compassion. I have tried to help you understand those gifts and help build on them. Ultimately, I hope I have been encouraging of you.

The truth and power of the United Methodist Church is not in its pastors but in the lay people and their ability to look beyond dogma and see the goodness and suffering of people. Methodism started out being led by lay people in small groups who loved the lord and wanted people to know God's grace and love and acceptance. Pastors were mostly there to help them understand scripture and how it applied to their lives and to serve communion. You are what the church is about.

Finally I want to close as Jesus closed with his Disciples and Paul closed with the churches he wrote to and that is to list some of my prayers:

- **1.** I pray that you will continue to be open to what God is calling you to be.
- 2. That you will find joy and pleasure being the church together despite whatever financial concerns you may have.
- **3.** My prayer is that you will find a way to pay off your building and make it a focus on ministry to the community. The building is your connection and ministry to the community. Your support of it is your mission and I believe part of your calling from God.
- **4.** Prayer that you will be that church that unites people in Christ. You will find a way to help people rise above partisanship and politics and to love and see one another as Christ loves and sees you. Remember the new commandment Jesus gave in John 13:34-35: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

As with any pastoral change there comes a new opportunity to share the good news of the Gospel of God's inclusive grace for all people. I have said this before but it bears keeping in mind. Everyone who is going to church in Woodland Park is going to a church. Who does that leave? Who are they? What do they need, how can we reach out with God's love and grace. While other churches are putting up walls you can be that church Paul hoped for, the church where Paul says in Galatians 3:26-28: "... for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek; there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male and female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

I know you can be that church and make Woodland Park an even better place for everyone to live and love. Thank you for allowing me to be your pastor these past three years. I will cherish you and all that we have done together in my heart and mind. And may we one day when it's all over, hear those words spoken by Paul when he was saying goodbye to his young prodigy Timothy in 2 Timothy 4:6-8: "As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for his appearance."





Giving - Mountain View



After a strong rebound in donations in March, we experienced a considerably softer April. The general donations were approximately \$3,000 below budget and the RTBG donations were \$2,000 lower than budgeted. All this resulted in a negative total funds flow in the month of \$7,100. However, thanks to your strong support we still have a positive total funds flow of \$12,000 year to date.

I am optimistic that we should be able to end the year in the positive. Thank you very much for your continued support to fulfill Mountain View's mission.

Integrational Ministry

Integration Team – is led by Angela Thelin with support from Elaine Gould. The Integration role is to reach out to people who have come into the church and visited or call on past members who haven't been visiting church in person.

Greeters - The coordination of greeters is led by Angela Thelin. Greeters welcome members and visitors on Sundays and special services. An important role in making everyone feel welcome.

Mountain of Fun Group – Coordinated by Angela Thelin. This group is two fold. To strengthen the bonds between our members who are part of this group and also to invite family and friends to the activities we will be hosting to create an environment of fun!

Dinner Groups – coordinated by Angela Thelin. Dinner groups are comprised of 8-10 people. Can meet in home, or restaurant or can meet at lunch or dinner, depending on the groups choice. We have two groups to date.



The Integration Team is coordinating the Dinner Groups. We did these before COVID and they were a lot of fun. Dinner groups build connections with fellow church members. Meeting over a meal bonds people together.

How it works:

- Groups will be assigned by the Integration Team pairing newer members with longtime members. They will be a group of 6 or 8.
- Each month a member of the group will host a dinner at their home, or you can decide to go out.
- Host will determine the menu based on the group's dietary restrictions.
- Host determines with the group the date and time to meet. It can be a lunch or a dinner.

- Host provides the main dish. If eating out, host may pay for apps or dessert.
- Participants of the group will bring a salad, rolls, vegetable, dessert or appetizer.

Groups are encouraged to change members once a year in order to ensure you meet new members.

Susan G. Komen (formerly known as Susan G. Komen for the Cure; originally as The Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation; often referred to simply as Komen) is a breast cancer organization in the United States.

Komen works on patient navigation and advocacy, providing resources for breast-cancer patients to understand the American medical system. They have funded research into the causes and treatment of breast cancer.

The foundation's namesake, Susan Goodman Komen, died of breast cancer in 1980 at age 36. Her younger sister Nancy Brinker, who has stated that she believed Susan's outcome might have been better had she known more about cancer and its treatment, founded the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation in 1982.

In 2007, the 25th anniversary of the organization, they changed the name to "Susan G. Komen for the Cure" and its logo to the pink ribbon. The logo represents Komen's signature Race for the Cure event, a jogging race that raises money for the foundation.


The Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure is Komen's main fundraising event and the world's largest funding event for breast cancer. It consists of a series of 5K runs and fitness walks to raise money and awareness for breast cancer.

The first race was run in Dallas, Texas in 1983, with 800 participants. By 2016, over 1.6 million people participated in the race.

The race's primary source of revenue is donations collected by the participants. In 2011, Komen said that three-quarters of the event's proceeds were being used locally to pay for community outreach programs, breast health education, and breast cancer screening and treatment projects run by the Komen affiliate, with the remaining quarter sent to the central organization.

Komen's other nationwide events include:

- Susan G. Komen 3-Day for the Cure, a 60-mile (97 km) fundraiser walk
- Susan G. Komen Marathon for the Cure fundraiser half and full marathon
- Susan G. Komen Bowl for the Cure fund-raising and awareness initiative founded in 2000 and sponsored by USBC and The Bowling Foundation

The older I get, the harder I find it to live in different places – with a heart divided between the two. Also, there have been several things that have happened in the last month that have made me aware of how quickly our lives can change.



But – let me back up and share the good with the bad!

Our "Christmas cactus" waited until Valentine's Day to bloom – a nice gift! We enjoyed a beautiful month of spectacular views in February.

The new post-partum maternity ward was finished and had an official opening. Now we just need more patients to fill it up!

We continue to struggle with lower patient numbers due to the failure of the govt insurance scheme. Looking for new ways to bring in patients, Les has started a once a week "general appointment clinic" (GAC) where people can book a time to meet with

him for their exam and tests. Every Tuesday he has what we teasingly refer to as the "Great American Clinic". Many years ago, patients would frequently come asking to see the "American doctor" and some of our missionary colleagues from countries like U.K., Australia, Canada and other

European countries threatened to go drink tea while Les saw all the patients! (At the time, he was the only American in the project).



Nepal continues to be a land of huge contrasts. While village ladies still carry loads in the traditional way, we can now travel in electric cars and vans! (Pink ones!)

The annual Hospital "marathon" (actually about 7 km) happened again this year. I walked with a group of other non-runners, and Les came in 6th overall – but first in the over 60's division.



We celebrated the opening of the waste water treatment plant after many years and many struggles! We are thankful to have cleaned up this hillside significantly for future generations.

At the hospital "bhoj" (feast/celebration) Les and I were honored with a certificate for our 25 years of service here. There was a 10-year gap in the middle, but it was nice to be recognized.

We also were pleased to be able to celebrate the 25-year anniversary of the Tansen School of Health Science just below the hospital – a school for nurses and lab technicians. It is wonderful to see all the bright young people studying to serve others in the medical profess

wonderful to see all the bright young people studying to serve others in the medical professions – when just 70 years ago, there were none!



In mid-March, we were very excited to welcome Rachel and husband Scott to Nepal! It was Scott's first trip, and we really enjoyed showing him all the places Rachel remembers fondly from her childhood: Pokhara, Tansen, and Chitwan. Rachel and Scott arrived home safely – but before they had the chance to see his mom, she passed away very suddenly. She was 67. That same week, our former pastor and good friend had a heart attack and even though

he was "revived" – heart started again – he never woke up. He also was 67. These were hard losses and made us feel even farther from friends and family in the U.S.

We were so happy to travel to UK in April to welcome our newest granddaughter! We enjoyed 2 weeks of just holding baby and trying to help mom and dad out a bit.



We are glad for the wonderful maternity leave (9 months with pay!) that Hannah can take advantage of in England. While we were there, we heard that a hospital staff in Tansen had climbed a tree to pick some fruit and fallen from the tree. He broke his back, several ribs on both sides, and his arm. He will not walk again, and after being helicoptered to KTM where he had surgery to stabilize his back, he was sent to Pokhara to start rehabilitation before returning to Tansen. His life will never be the same. The family may have to move



house, or do major renovations to make it wheelchair accessible. Even

the lab where he worked in the hospital is not able to be reached by wheelchair. Many prayers are being lifted up for him and his family, and the hospital is already talking about what changes might be made here so he can return to work again.

Life happens so quickly! 4 1/2 weeks ago I tripped on the path and fell – and broke my little finger on my left hand. It was in a splint for 4 weeks (it did get me out of changing diapers and doing dishes!!) but I pray it will heal strong and straight so I can play clarinet again! Of course - that is a small thing when compared with losing the ability to walk – or grieving a death.

Finally, we are very thankful to have learned that our CT scanner has been fully funded! We are now in the process of purchasing an appropriate machine and preparing a room for it in the hospital. This was such a huge answer to prayer.

We are coming to the end of our time here in Tansen – we plan to return to the U.S. in late October. We will spend several months visiting churches, and have been or will be in touch about that. Then we will retire from Global Ministries.

We pray that we will finish well – and that those who are staying here and coming after us will find that we have been faithful in our service.

And we pray for you – we are so thankful for your support and prayers over these many years. We pray if you don't already, that you would come to know the grace and peace that can come only through faith in Jesus. He alone has seen us through the good and the bad, and we are thankful.

God calls you to a life of servanthood as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Leading, caring, communicating. Ministries all-encompassing; ministries based on love and service ... So begins the history of lay servant ministry. 
